# Principal's Corner

Holy Week is a special time of reflection on all that Jesus did for us. It's sometimes hard to bring those ideas to reality in our minds. We hear the story so often that it sometimes seems like a TV show or a story book. The reality is that Jesus actually went through all that suffering and death because He loves each of us.

Several years ago, the movie "The Passion of the Christ" was released to much hype and discussion. Lots of people saw the movie, discussed it and spoke of the reality of it. It caused people to see graphically the cruelty of Jesus' suffering. The movie, however, was about that suffering and fell short on what happened three days later—His Resurrection.

So as we enter into the Triduum today, we reflect on how that affects us and helps us to understand the love of Jesus, without only focusing on His terrible suffering.

Children understand Jesus, probably far better than adults because the images and stories of Jesus with children all show His understanding and love of them. Even in the days and culture of His time, Jesus allowed children near him. He laughed with them, and even let them climb all over Him. He expected them to be kids. Children naturally relate to His goodness.

Yes, they also need to know about His suffering—but in terms they can understand. Children can understand that He was condemned without cause and didn't complain. Ask your child if they have ever been accused of something they didn't do. Suggest to them that Jesus had never done anything wrong—not ever—and yet He didn't protest. They can understand that He could have escaped death, but He didn't—He loved us so much.

They can understand that they need to live their lives within His guidelines. Sometimes the concept of sin is lost in our society. Everything is justified. Kids need to know sin exists in the world and in each of us. That's why Jesus died—to overcome evil so that we could see—and BE light to the world.


